The Convent Kids program is underpinned by this philosophy, and we create environments where children and families feel welcome to connect with their community and participate in play-based learning together.

The Bees are silly and serious, fascinating and fun; and leave you flying high and looking at the world in a different way.

We hope it gave your family a buzz and you enjoyed becoming part of the Bee world.

Explorations at home



Make

- Make your own costume using found or recycled objects, fabric, paper and tape.
- Make lots of little bees and create a 'Swarm of Bees' hanging mobile.
- ••• Make tiny Bees and hang them on branches or place them in flowers and plants.
- Make a Bee puppet with an old sock or paper bag that you can put over your hand and decorate. Make your Bee fly, dance, collect pollen, and sting!
- ---- Draw or paint pictures of bees and create an art gallery and serve honey snacks to your visitors.

Cook

Make yummy honey treats: biscuits, cakes, honey-infused banana bread or smoothies.

Build

Bees build and live in honeycomb hives made up of a series of small spaces next to and on top of each other. Build your own hive using objects from around your home.

Move

Bees communicate by doing a 'Waggle Dance' and flying in a figure-eight shape. Put on your favourite music and dance your best bee moves following a figure-eight path.

Look and share

Collect flowers from your neighbourhood and make a little posy or bouquet. Do you know their names? Notice the different colours and shapes. Can you smell any fragrance? Can you see the pollen in the centre of the flower?

Games

Bees Chasey - the chaser is the 'Stinger'. Whoever gets stung falls to the ground and dies dramatically with a loud buzz and is out of the game. Or choose a Queen Bee and form a Swarm of Bees with friends and play Follow the Leader.
