About Voice Lab

Voice Lab embodies Polyglot's vision to empower children. Its purpose is to listen to children's voices and use the information they provide to make meaningful changes that can improve their lives.

Voice Lab is a creative installation module for listening to the thoughts and opinions of children. It encourages reflective thinking and the articulation of opinions and feelings.

Children are often overlooked when it comes to life's big questions, and if they are asked for their true opinions, they generally give the answers they think adults want to hear. Voice Lab challenges this learned experience, providing children with an unmediated space in which to express themselves without inhibition.

Voice Lab's questions can be completely tailored to explore children's world views or to gather feedback on their experience of the arts, at school or in their community.

Voice Lab operates in two modes: the original physical mode and an online mode. In both, children have a conversation with Voice Lab – a voice driven by a concealed live performer that asks questions, encourages opinion and regards the child as the expert.

Physical

With the physical mode, the child will be greeted by a friendly Polyglot facilitator, who will explain what is going to happen, and ensure the child is happy to proceed. They then invite the child to enter a beautifully designed, serene dome. Through a small entrance, they crawl, by themselves, into a soft, comforting space filled with warm fluctuating light. On the floor, at the end of a long cord connected to the roof of the dome, is a set of headphones. Through these they hear a voice — it is Voice Lab.

The structure consists of a dome within a larger dome. The child enters the smaller dome. Hidden in the space between the two is Voice Lab's operator, and from this control centre, they trigger pre-recorded questions for the child to answer. The operator can also interact with them directly through a microphone.

Voice Lab conversations always begin with introductory questions to make the child feel comfortable and build rapport.

- What is your name?
- → How old are you?
- What is your favourite colour?

The lighting then changes to the child's favourite colour. This ensures the child knows that Voice Lab is listening to them, and that they are in control of the conversation. As they are unaware of the concealed operator, it appears as though the space itself is speaking to them, asking them questions and interacting with them in a magical, one-of-a-kind experience.

Online

In the online mode, Voice Lab operates over Zoom. It can be offered as an experience that children participate in from their own homes and devices, or in a centralised location, like a school or community centre

For partners using the online mode, a lightweight, pop-up inflatable space can be easily couriered from Polyglot's headquarters in Melbourne, VIC. It is quick and easy to set up – you simply unroll it, plug it in, and put a laptop inside. It has been designed to imbue the online experience with the otherworldliness and magic that the original dome offers. Children enter the pop-up space one at a time, and their conversation with Voice Lab takes place via Zoom through the laptop.

When the participant arrives in their online Voice Lab session - the Zoom meeting – they are greeted by a friendly Polyglot facilitator. The facilitator checks that the participant's technology is working correctly and encourages the use of headphones if available. They explain what is going to happen in the session and ensure the child feels comfortable and ready to proceed.

The facilitator then turns off their own audio and video and the screen fills with colour and Voice Lab welcomes the participant to the space. The digital interface is a colourful screen that slowly changes colour throughout the session. At the centre of the screen is a glowing circle that reacts to voice and gently pulses as the conversation unfolds.

The online mode has the capacity to reach thousands of children who might previously have been unable to engage due to geographical remoteness, or other access barriers.

Children operate at a different pace and intention to adults. When they enter a very special, beautiful space, they are instantly more open emotionally.

The theatrical premise of Voice Lab brings something unique to the way a child interacts; it provides a sense of ritual and focus, enabling their imagination to fly because they are removed from the everyday world.

Voice Lab offers privacy, attention, time and design. It allows children agency and ability to give their own opinions without interruption, mediation or interpretation by adults or peers.



For children

- Privacy: Voice Lab is entirely your own while you are inside. No one can intrude. Your thoughts and actions are your own. You are not seeking anyone else's approval.
- Attention: You are being listened to and being heard. Your voice is interesting and valued. You are the sole focus.
- Time: Voice Lab travels at your speed. There is no hurry. There is time to think, to imagine, to expand. You can allow your thoughts to unfold in detail.
- **Design:** This space has been made for you to enjoy with all your senses. You can sit or lie down, you can close your eyes or look around.

Why children's voices?

"The right of children and young people to participate in decisions that affect them is one of the four guiding principles in the Convention on the Rights of the Child... Eliciting and capturing children's opinions and experience in matters concerning them is difficult to effect authentically and with clarity of purpose. Throughout the development of Voice Lab, we have been influenced by others' explorations into empowerment of children, participation of children in structural, social or systematic re-design, and children at the heart of consultation.

The act of listening to children and allowing them time and attention — hearing what they have to say — means that children are considered as valuable in our society as contributors. Research shows that once children are valued, their safety increases.



FAQs & Ethics

What kind of space/equipment do I need to use Voice Lab?

The physical mode needs to be set up inside, in a cool, quiet space. It contains technical elements that cannot get wet. The inside of the dome can get very hot in direct sun and/or warm weather, and external noise can impact the quality of the recordings.

If the online mode is being used to speak with children remotely, participants require a device – a computer, tablet or smartphone – that is connected to the internet. Using headphones is optimal, and a quiet space away from other people is ideal.

If the online mode is being used on-site in conjunction with the inflatable pop-up space, this needs to be set up in a cool, quiet, indoor area. A device – a computer, tablet or smartphone – that is connected to the internet and is plugged into a power source is also required.

What is the ideal age range of Voice Lab participants?

Children aged 4-12 years.

How long is each Voice Lab conversation?

This depends on the number of questions being asked, and how the child responds. Not all participants will answer all of the questions. Conversations can range from 2-12 minutes. Generally, children spend around six minutes speaking to Voice Lab.



What kinds of questions can Voice Lab ask?

They can be completely tailored to explore children's worldviews and/or gather insight and feedback on their experiences: at school, at home, in the community, in healthcare settings, in the arts. Polyglot will work with you to understand the kind of information you are seeking, and ensure your questions are specific and age-appropriate.

What is the ideal number of questions?

Between 20-30.

How many children can Voice Lab speak to in a day?

This varies, according to how it is being used and the number of questions being asked. Generally, about eight children per hour can speak with Voice Lab, and the operator needs a break every 90 minutes.

In education contexts, with school hours and breaks, Voice Lab can speak with approximately 25 children. In an all-day festival environment, Voice Lab can speak with up to 60 children.

What happens if a child is afraid to enter the Voice Lab dome/pop-up space?

Occasionally, children are wary of entering Voice Lab by themselves. In these instances, the facilitator, teacher or parent can sit in with them until the child feels comfortable to continue on their own. In some environments, it's possible to run 'tour groups' to Voice Lab where up to five children at a time can enter the dome/pop-up space with their teacher or other responsible adult and listen to the music coming from the crown. This usually empowers the kids to experience their individual session without fear.

How does Polyglot seek permission for children to participate?

Written consent is obtained from the child and their parent/guardian before participating, and consent is specifically obtained for future use of the child's de-identified words. Consent is additionally sought at two stages during the Voice Lab conversation: once at the beginning, "Are you happy to stay to answer some questions?" And once at the end, "Are you happy for Voice Lab to share your thoughts and opinions with others?" Participants can choose to leave Voice Lab, and/or withdraw their consent, at any stage of the engagement.

Is it ethical to collect information from children if they do not know there is a real person listening to them?

All participants and their parents/guardians must complete a consent form which states that the child's voice will be recorded, and that if they say anything of concern to Voice Lab, the parent/guardian/educator/other responsible adult will be informed. Even though children are not aware that Voice Lab is a real person, they are aware that their words will be heard outside of their conversation. Having a live operator allows Voice Lab to be responsive.



What is the risk management process if a child says something of concern?

Polyglot is a Child Safe Organisation. All employees hold current Working with Children Checks, and adhere to Polyglot Theatre's Code of Conduct and Child Safe Policy. If a child says something of concern during their conversation, the Voice Lab Operator will inform the facilitator, who will follow up with a representative from the hosting partner. Organisational protocols will then be followed. A report will also be made to Polyglot's Child Safety Officer who will ensure the report goes to the relevant body.
